

The Sarah Riggs Humphreys-Mary Silliman Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, in conjunction with the City of Shelton has installed this Patriots Marker in commemoration of the semiquincentennial of the United States. The U.S. Semiquincentennial Commission was established by Congress to inspire all Americans to participate in this great milestone — the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States. The NSDAR was the first heritage society to formally partner with this national committee. This celebration is also known as America 250!

As one of Connecticut's oldest chapters, founded in 1893, the Sarah Riggs Humphreys-Mary Silliman Chapter is proud to include this monument in the Veterans Memorial Park that was founded to recognize and honor the men and women who served our country in the military services. The addition of this Revolutionary War Patriots marker at Veterans Memorial Park honors those Shelton patriots who served and aided the American Revolutionary cause.

The Shelton area was first occupied by the Pootatuck hunting tribe, located along the Housatonic River. In 1659, Moses Wheeler was the first European to purchase land from the Pootatuck tribe in the White Hills section of the city. The first English settlers moved out of Stratford in 1680, establishing farms in Coram, as they called the Long Hill section of Shelton. The village grew until, in 1717, fifty families sought parish status for their settlement. The Connecticut General Assembly granted this petition, establishing Ripton Parish. The heart of the parish was what is now the Huntington green, with farms and mills of various types located along the rivers. Many residents served in the French and Indian Wars, and citizen David Wooster became a colonial general. During the Revolution, he renounced his royal command to join the patriot cause. Other Ripton citizens joined the militia, serving at Bunker Hill, Long Island and Danbury, where General Wooster lost his life. Supplies were secretly removed from Danbury, which was under British attack, and hidden at Captain Joseph Birdsey's farm in the White Hills section. In 1781, French officers, part of a 600-man force, were entertained in Huntington while en route to Monroe and participated with George Washington in the Yorktown victory.

This DAR Revolutionary War Patriots Marker honors all the men and women from this area who helped to achieve America's independence. Below is a list of some of the patriots identified by the Sarah Riggs Humphreys-Mary Silliman Chapter.
